A few weeks ago, Shirley Adams and I went to visit Bill Colby, a life-long member of Pemberton United Methodist Church. As we sat in his Medford retirement facility, he shared memories of the church. This was one of those rewarding experiences that helped me have a more profound understanding of the church. Bill spoke of his love for Pemberton and how “everybody knew everybody.” Bill recalled singing in the Junior Choir as a child and attending Bible Study in the mid 1940’s, which was held in the basement of the church. He went on to say, “I remember going to Youth Fellowship, with the wallboards painted black up to the windows. You see, because of the war you couldn’t have lights escaping from your home or church.” When Bill played with the other kids in the playground, if the siren went off, you would have to fall on the ground and put your hands over your head. All of this was taking place during World War II. In spite of the war, the church remained the safe place for all.

Years later, the church-at-large seeks to be a safe place for all people despite their color, race, nationality or sexual orientation. Yet, for some, this is not a reality. Therefore, as a church body, we must continue to be light in the midst of darkness. People who are in need of healing, love, restoration, encouragement, and hope, should be able to find it in the House of God. Days ago, many of us heard of the Jewish synagogue attack in Pittsburgh which killed 11 people. The ages of the 11 victims ranged from 54 to 97. Some may say this not does affect us. Yet, it was Jesus who came into this world as a brown-skinned, Middle Eastern Jewish immigrant. The bible describes him in Revelation 1:13-15, “...And in the midst of the lampstands I saw one like the Son of Man, clothed with a long robe and with a golden sash across his chest. His head and his hair were white as white wool, white as snow; his eyes were like a flame of fire, his feet were like burnished bronze, refined as in a furnace, and his voice was like the sound of many waters.” If we follow Christ, we must be concerned with his God’s creation and pray for those who have been affected by these heinous acts of terrorism and xenophobia and ensure that our church remains a safe place for all.
